We suggest heading to Yanesen. North of Ueno, Nezu and Yanaka are two of Tokyo's most charmingly old-fashioned neighbourhoods and a world away from the usual hustle and bustle of the city. Along with neighbouring Sendagi they form an area referred to as Yanesen where you can experience a slower and more relaxed side of Tokyo. Strewn with small temples, craft shops, galleries and cafes, it's a great area to wander and make your own discoveries. Highlights include the historic and tranquil shrine Nezu-jinja, picturesque and historic Yanaka Cemetery, and the old-style shopping street of Yanaka Ginza.

Spend the day exploring independently at leisure. Today we suggest taking the bullet train north out of Tokyo for a day trip to Nikko. We recommend a visit to the intricately carved Tosho-gu Shrine complex, and the Rinno-ji Temple, which dates from the eight century and houses three important Buddhist deities. The Futarasan Shrine, a Shinto place of worship also founded in the eighth century (by a Buddhist monk) is the third of Nikko's main sights.

Spend the afternoon exploring independently at your leisure. Matsumoto Castle is one of Japan's few original castles standing, and is one of only four listed as national treasures. Of these, it is the second oldest. On arrival in Matsumoto, it's a 15 minute walk from the station to the castle, or simply jump in a taxi if preferred.

Known as the "Crow Castle" due to its unusual black colour, Matsumoto Castle was built during the late 16th century. The internal gun museum and an extensive folk-lore museum are included in the 600 yen entry fee. English speaking volunteer guides are sometimes available, and well worth asking for at the entrance.

Established in 1887, Matsumoto Hotel Kagetsu is Matsumoto's oldest hotel. Rooms went through renovation works in April 2016, and feature classic furnishings. You'll find a 24-hour front desk, a public bath, free-use bicycles and free property-wide WiFi.

Well-appointed rooms come with both air conditioning and heating facilities. In-room conveniences include a fridge and a hairdryer.

For leisure, guests can explore the town on a bike or enjoy massage services on request. Luggage storage and laundry services are available. Porter service is available for guests staying in the annex building.

Kagetsu Hotel is a 5-minute bus ride from JR Matsumoto Station and a 5-minute walk from the historic Matsumoto Castle and Nawate Street.

Today we recommend having a relaxing day with a visit to the old-fashioned streets of Nawate-dori and Nakamachi-dori, which contain a surprising mix of old and new, with shops selling ceramics, bonsai trees, and vintage kimonos next to traditional soba noodle restaurants and trendy cafes, all housed in picturesque wooden buildings.

Later, spend some time at Matsumoto's Japan Ukiyo-e Museum, which has an impressive collection of 100,000 prints - many by the masters of the technique - and though only a fraction are on display at any one time, it is well worth visiting.



Wander the cobbled streets, and explore the old buildings, some of which are open as museums. We highly recommend a visit to the Honjin and Waki Honjin. There are several nice cafes in the charming old buildings which line the main street - though don't expect cake with your coffee, as the local speciality is gohei-mochi, a slightly sweet rice dumpling.

Day 6

Overnight luggage transfer: Tsumago to Nakatsugawa

To allow you to travel comfortably your luggage will be sent from Tsumago to Nakatsugawa overnight. We suggest packing a small overnight bag as you will be without the bulk of your luggage for this evening.



After breakfast, set off to hike to Magome along the Nakasendo Way, which runs through the very centre of Japan, brushing the shoulders of the Japan Alps and winding along river valleys and over forested passes. The best preserved of the five Edo Period highways, the Nakasendo Road connected Kyoto and Tokyo. Long stretches, particularly in the more mountainous regions, remain very much as they did in the 17th century, and it is still possible to walk the route of the highway between the old and new capitals.

Of the nearly seventy post towns between Tokyo and Kyoto, the eleven in the Kiso Valley offer a glimpse of rural Japan as it once was: cobbled stretches of the old highway run between rows of traditional wooden houses in the mainly pedestrian villages, and forests cling to the steep slopes.

Though many of the Kiso Valley post towns are accessible on foot, walking between the charmingly outdated towns of Tsumago and Magome in particular is a popular way to get a feel for the old highway. The track is well sign-posted and leads through farmland and forest, with original ishidatami cobbles.

This is a cosy family-run traditional Japanese inn in the middle of the old post town of Magome. All the rooms at Magome Chaya are Japanese-style, and all bathing and toilet facilities are shared among the guests. The building was originally built in the 18th century and the present owners have been running the inn for 3 generations. Fresh, local cuisine is served in the inn's dining area and guests can relax in the wooden tubs after a long day's hike.

Today you will continue your journey towards Nakatsugawa, a small city at the end of the Kiso Valley. Nakatsugawa borders Oi post town, now known as modern day Ena city. Leaving the Kiso valley behind you, the landscape gradually changes into gently rolling hills and rice fields.

In Nakatsugawa you can visit the Naegi Castle Ruins or perhaps the Nakasendo Highway Historical Museum to learn about the history of these postal towns.

In Ena, you can visit the excellent Hiroshige Print Museum, where you can see a wonderful collection of Hiroshige's ukiyo-e prints.

Check-out



This charming inn comprises of 8 traditional private buildings, for ultimate privacy and relaxation. Each building is a traditional cottage-style, some including a Japanese fire place or tea room. In 1957, the Emperor Prince Akihito stayed at this very inn, and other writers and artist have descended on this beautiful ryokan in the past.

Make use of the indoor public bath and also the outdoor public bath, from where you can enjoy greenery and fresh air. There is also a traditional tea room and a stone monument dedicated to the poets Wakayama Bokusui and Takahama Kyoshi, who wrote about birds in the area.

The food served here is prepared depending on the season, with only the freshest produce used.

Spend your arrival afternoon exploring at leisure. We suggest visting the Hida Folk Village open-air museum.

See over 30 traditional houses from the Hida region, the mountainous district of Gifu Prefecture around Takayama. The houses were built during the Edo Period (1603 - 1867) and were relocated from their original locations to create the museum in 1971. In a village-like atmosphere, the museum features buildings such as the former village head's house, logging huts, storehouses and a number of gassho-zukuri farmhouses.

Afterwards, perhaps head to the Hida Takayama Crafts Experience Centre and enjoy a workshop on local crafts such as sarubobo dolls (a popular local doll), wind chimes and ceramic cups.

The Hotel Wood is a wooden structure hotel that incorporates our concept of ZEN to enable you to experience mindfulness and relaxation. We harmonise Japanese and local Takayama culture to provide exceptional trips for guests.

It is located in the idyllic center of the old township of Takayama. During Takayama's spring festival, parade floats pass right in front of the hotel. At night, guests can enjoy a quiet evening about town unhindered by city noise. And a five-minute walk to the morning market offers pleasant exchanges with the local folk.

Accompanied by your guide, spend the day exploring Takayama. Start early at the vibrant morning markets, which have an interesting mix of crafts and produce for sale, and make a great place to try local foods, people-watch, and shop for souvenirs.

There are two markets to visit; the Jinya-mae Market in front of the Takayama Jinya and the Miya-gawa Market on the east bank of Miya River, between Kaji-bashi bridge and Yayoi-bashi bridge.

The latter is more attractive and larger, but both have farmer's stalls with local vegetables, old women selling pickles, and an interesting assortment of local handicrafts.

Head on to Teramachi, the temple district, which is home to over a dozen temples and shrines; exploring the buildings and precincts, and the pleasant walk between them is a good way to get to know one of Takayama's important districts.

Start the afternoon at Takayama Jinya, before visiting the San-machi Suji area of wooden merchant houses, many of which are now museums. The old town is full of sake breweries, which can be identified by the cedar balls hanging outside.

End the day with a visit to the Yatai Kaikan, where the huge, majestic and ornate floats used in the famous Takayama Festival are stored when not in use. Some of the floats date back to the 17th Century and are decorated with intricate carvings of gilded wood, and detailed metal-work, rich design, similar in style to art from Kyoto during the Momoyama period, and blended with elements from the early Edo period. Detailed carving, lacquering and beautiful decorative metal-works is found not only on the outside of the floats, but inside as well, under the roof and behind the panels, where the work is amazingly detailed.




This morning leave Takayama for Kanazawa.

En route, enjoy a trip to visit the beautifully preserved area of Shirakawa-go, famous for steeply thatched gassho-zukuri houses. The largest village in the area is Ogimachi, which has a good look-out over the town. Many of the houses are open to the public as museums.

Depending on how much time you would like to spend in Shirakawago, you may have some time available for sightseeing upon arrival in Kanazawa Your guide will be able to let you know what options are available and will be able to show you around some local highlights.

Day 11



Enjoy a full day tour of Kanazawa by private car. Start with a visit to the well-preserved samurai district of Nagamachi, where many of the houses are now museums giving a glimpse into Kanazawa's feudal past.

Continue on to Higashi Chaya-gai, one of Japan's best preserved geisha districts, and the old wooden buildings are a wonderful place to feel transported back centuries. Some of the traditional buildings are open as museums, and it is also here that you can visit the gold-leaf workshop which produces so much of Kanazawa's most famous product.

Visit the covered arcade of the Omicho Ichiba Markets - the heart of Kanazawa's impressive food culture and an excellent sport for lunching, snacking, or people watching.

Later, visit Teramachi, a collection of temples, the most famous of which is the Ninja Temple, which we are happy to make you a reservation to join the guided tours of. Nearby, the Kutani Kosen Gama Kiln still makes highly decorated functional pottery, and you can visit the workshop and see how the traditional ceramics are made here.

Spend the day exploring at leisure.

Kenroku-en is one of Japan's most beautiful gardens, and today we suggest spending several hours exploring the grounds, which are full of blossoming flowers, ancient trees, and impressive landscaping. We highly recommend visiting the elegant Seison-kaku Villa in the park while you are there. When you've seen enough nature, visit the Kanazawa Castle Park, where you can explore the recently reconstructed buildings of what was one of Japan's largest castles.

End the day with a visit to The 21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art, which contrasts impressively with Kanazawa's traditional feel, but the art housed there - and the frequently rotating exhibits - make it a must-see for those interested in contemporary art and culture



Day 14



Start the day by visiting some of the iconic sights in the North West of the city. See the stunning Golden Pavilion and Ryoan-ji Zen Garden before visiting the nearby Ninna-ji Temple, which houses one of Kyoto's loveliest gardens.

Spend the afternoon exploring Arashiyama, an area in the West of the city. The famous bridge here has been depicted for centuries in woodblock paintings. The area has an old-timey atmosphere, and is a popular spot for kimono wearing in the Spring and Autumn.

The area is also famous for its bamboo grove, located right by the stunning UNESCO Tenryu-ji Temple. It is here that you can see the picture-postcard view of the green towers of bamboo swaying in the breeze.

Spend the day exploring independently at leisure. We suggest visiting Nara - a great place to escape from modern Japan. See the impressive giant bronze Buddha - Japan's largest - housed in the famous all-wood Todai-ji temple. Then enjoy a walk through Nara-koen Park, which is home to very friendly local deer who will follow you hoping for tasty treats! The Kasuga Taisha Shrine, which dates from Nara's time as the capital of Japan, is also located in the park and is well worth a visit.

On your way back into Kyoto you might like to stop off at the famous Fushimi Inari shrine, known for its thousands of red torii gates leading up the hillside. A visit here is the perfect way to work up an appetite for Kyoto's wonderful cuisine!

Make your way to a traditional machiya townhouse, where you will first have a tour of the machiya before being dressed in kimono for your Tea Ceremony, perhaps the most enigmatic of the traditional arts. This will be followed by a light, Kyoto style lunch.

Spend the afternoon exploring independently at leisure. We suggest a visit to nearby Nishiki Market, a long, narrow covered street packed with shops selling local specialities which is sometimes referred to as Kyoto's kitchen. Barrels of fresh and pickled vegetables spill out into the street, and the air is fragrant with the savoury smell of grilling *sembei* crackers and steaming fish dumplings. Many of the shops offer free samples, and the Nishiki Market is a wonderful way to stock up on very Japanese picnic supplies for lunch.

Next, we recommend heading to Nishijin Textile Centre, where you can learn about the fascinating process behind the manufacturing of the kimono. In addition, there are daily kimono shows, displaying the beauty and potential of this beautiful garment.

Perhaps finish your day with a visit to the UNESCO Site of Nijo Castle, former home of the Tokugawa Shogun. On exploring the beautifully decorated interior, you can walk on the 'nightingale floors', so-called because the design of the floorboards causes them to squeak when stepped upon - almost like a chirp. End your visit with a stroll around the lush gardens.

This ryokan hotel is located in the Northern part of Shikoku in Iya Valley. A unique feature of Hotel Iya Valley is the cable car which will take guests to the rotenburo (open-air bath) at the bottom of the valley. It takes about five minutes to descend the 170 meters drop. Along the way one can enjoy a panoramic view of the valley.

The open-air baths, one for men and one for women, have been constructed along the Iya river. They are rich with hot spring water which is cloudy with minerals which bubble straight from a source deep in the earth.

Traditional breakfast and dinner is served at the restaurant of the hotel, but for an extra fee guests can enjoy their meals in the privacy of their rooms.



Day 20



13 bridges once spanned the valley, but only three survive today. Iya Kazurabashi (祖かずら橋), the largest and most popular of the remaining bridges, stretches 45 meters across the Iya River at the centre of the valley, and gives visitors an unsettling view of the water 14 meters below the open slats of the span. The bridge, which is rebuilt every three years, is anchored to tall cedar trees at both ends and has steel cables hidden within the vines for safety. The bridge can be crossed in one direction only.

Continue on to visit Oboke Gorge and neighbouring Koboke Gorge. These are narrow, steep sided gorges near the entrance to the Iya Valley and popularly combined with a visit there. Cut by the swirling rapids of the Yoshino River, their names mean "big dangerous steps" and "small dangerous steps" as their jagged, rocky walls can be perilous to navigate.

The gorges are one of the leading outdoor destinations in Japan, and are known for their beautiful natural scenery and for the variety of outdoor attractions, such as white-water rafting and canyoning, that can be enjoyed on the river.

Today you will also visit the quaint Chiiori thatched farmhouses between 13:00 - 14:00. ****The area around Chiiori becomes** very dangerous in snowy weather so this part of the tour will be changed depending on weather conditions.**





Spend the day exploring Osaka at leisure.
