Many start their journey in Japan by taking the stage transfixed by the bright lights of <u>Tokyo's</u> Shinjuku or blinded by the neon canals of <u>Osaka's</u> Dotonbori. We offer you a peek behind the curtain to experience the true heart of Japan with a taste of rural (*inaka*) life. Come wintertime, the charming <u>liyama</u> Valley in the mountainous <u>Nagano</u> Prefecture undergoes a breath-taking transformation, the towering snow drifts, not only heralding a unique selection of seasonal activities and world-famous ski slopes, but summoning the resolve of locals to overcome the trials of winter together.



It's this spirit of togetherness that we invite you to experience during your winter holiday. During the <u>Dosojin</u> festival beneath the ski lifts of Nozawa, wield fire to burn towering offerings to the Gods. Singing and drinking under the falling embers, bringing your bad omens down with them to melt away into the snow. Beneath the gates of the *Kamakura-no-sato* near the overlooking Togari ski resort, curl up inside igloos for a cosy winter experience. Watch the stark contrast of the pure snow and the azure sky fade to black, permeated by the glow of paper lanterns.

Not only the famed Nozawa but also Madarao, Togari, and Kijima-daira ski resorts offer a thrilling powder skiing experience. Their mountains are home to some of the highest rates of snowfall in Japan. Whether skiing or snowboarding, carve waist-deep tracks in snow as soft as anywhere you can find it in Japan. Craft beer pubs in Nozawa and delicious local eateries

like *Penticton* café enter the culinary fray each winter, eager to warm the frozen bones of those hitting the slopes.
