Expert Profile: Karan

Karan, who grew up in this remarkable region of Japan, shares her personal recommendations and insider tips:



What is your favourite area of Niigata?

Tokamachi is definitely my favourite part of Niigata. Though I should show loyalty to my hometown, Kamo—often called the little Kyoto of the Hokuriku region— Tokamachi holds a special place in my heart. Nestled deep in snow country, it sees some of the highest snowfall in Japan, turning the rice paddies and mountains into a magical winter landscape. If you visit in winter, I highly recommend the Tokamachi Snow Festival, where local groups and artists create amazing snow sculptures.

What makes Niigata so special compared to other rural areas of Japan?

Niigata is a prefecture which experiences extremes in climate and temperature every year with deep snowdrifts covering the mountains in winter and sweltering heats in the summer. Living in these extremes has shaped some really unique traditions and ways of living. For example, *yukimuro* is a food preservation technique which ages and preserves food buried in snow mounds.

What is your favourite Niigata cuisine?

If I had to choose it would be *sasadango*! Dark green mochi wrapped around unctuous red bean paste, all wrapped in bamboo leaves to make a little pocket of joy. Every time I snack on *sasadango* it transports me back to times when I'd be cycling around my hometown with *obaachan* and we'd stop at seemingly every shop along the way, but it was all worth it for a bite of my favourite food.


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
